

Esther 1:1 NIV

At that time King Xerxes
reigned from his royal throne
in the citadel of Susa,

Esther 1:2 NIV

And in the third year of his
reign he gave a banquet for all
his nobles and officials.

Esther 1:3a NIV

The military leaders of persia
and Media, the princes, and the
nobles of the provinces were
present

Esther 1:3b NIV

King Xerxes

Therefore, if it pleases the king, let him issue a royal decree and let it be written in the laws of Persia and Media, which cannot be repealed,

Esther 1:19a NIV

That Vashti is never again to enter the presence of King Xerxes. Also let the king give her royal position to someone else who is better than she.

Esther 1:19b NIV

Then when the king's edict is proclaimed throughout all his vast realm, all the women will respect their husbands, from the least to the greatest.

Esther 1:20 NIV

After these events, King Xerxes honored Haman son of Hammedatha, the Agagite, elevating him and giving him a seat of honor higher than that of all the other nobles.

Esther 3:1 NIV

All the royal officials at the king's gate knelt down and paid honor to Haman, for the king had commanded this concerning him. But Mordecai would not kneel down or pay him honor.

Esther 3:2 NIV

Then Haman said to King Xerxes, “There is a certain people dispersed among the peoples in all the provinces of your kingdom who keep themselves separate.

Esther 3:8a NIV

Their customs are different from those of all other people, and they do not obey the king's laws; it is not in the king's best interest to tolerate them.

Esther 3:8b NIV

If it pleases the king, let a decree be issued to destroy them, and I will give ten thousand talents of silver to the king's administrators for the royal treasury.

Mordecai

- Jewish exile

Mordecai had a cousin named Hadassah, whom he had brought up because she had neither father nor mother.

Esther 2:7a NIV

This young woman, who was also known as Esther, had a lovely figure and was beautiful. Mordecai had taken her as his own daughter when her father and mother died.

During the time Mordecai was sitting at the king's gate, Bigthana and Teresh, two of the king's officers who guarded the doorway, became angry and conspired to assassinate King Xerxes.

Esther 2:21 NIV

But Mordecai found out about the plot and told Queen Esther, who in turn reported it to the king, giving credit to Mordecai.

And when the report was investigated and found to be true, the two officials were impaled on poles. All this was recorded in the book of the annals in the presence of the king.

uncle Abihail) to go to the king,

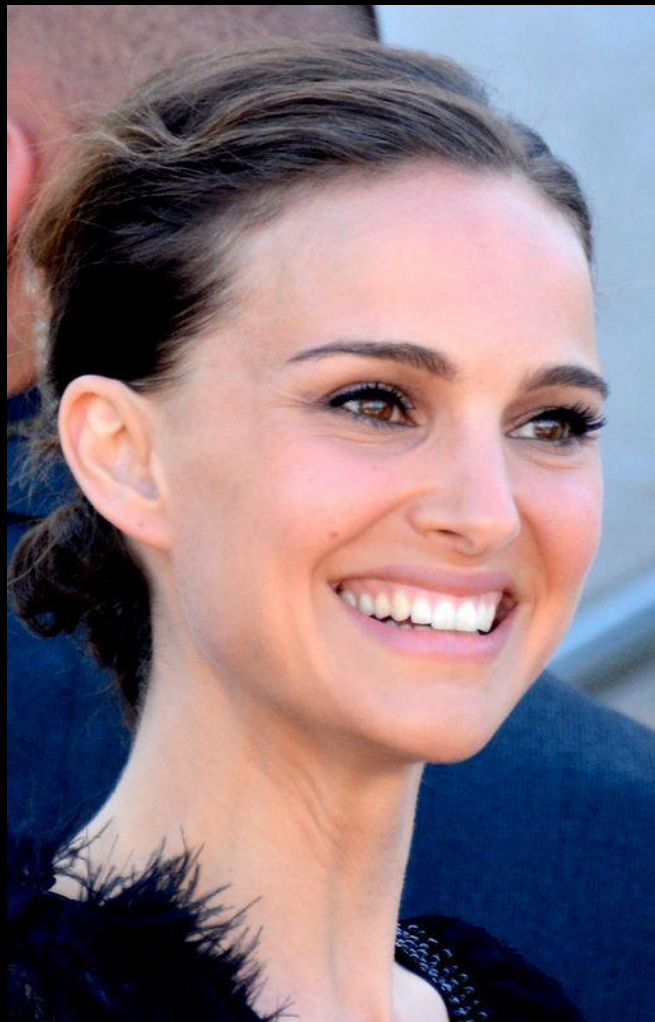
Esther 2:15a NIV
